Nouredin and my other brother Abdelhak have chosen to live in America instead of living close to us in France.


Nouredin was dreaming about America since he was a little boy, he was all the time explaining to us that his beloved country is an example of freedom and democracy.

I am Halima LE RAY born Halima Malki; I am the oldest sister of Nouredin Malki. By the present letter, I would like to announce you very sincerely my feeling towards my brother who always shouted clearly and loudly his affection to the country that welcomed him and allowed him to live with dignity.

If it can help you understanding what kind of man are you judging, please find bellow an extract of the life he had before he went to America.

Nouredin's youth in Morocco was difficult, our mother died very earlier, leaving behind her still young children, and our father quickly remarried. Nouredin was deprived of everything, slept in the street, ate at the neighbor's and was regularly subject to ragging on behalf of his mother-in-law.

We all had to flee this universe and we are five brother and sisters settled in France and naturalized French.

Very young, Nouredin joined the American Cultural Centre in Casablanca and learnt English conscientiously.

He was moreover appreciated by his professors who advised him to go to end his studies in the USA. He worked very hard to make a success of this bet.

In the USA, Nouredin managed to pursue his studies, while exercising an employment to earn a living. He prepared successfully the diploma from Masters Computer Sciences.

He spoke to us about America, as his true homeland (having even intended in the time to go to clean the coasts of Alaska against the oil slick). His objective always was to live in this country which he likes so much and he can serve it is indeed thanks to the USA, that he was able to have a comfortable life, the one that he constantly wished. In Morocco he knew only suffering and misery.

The occasion appeared at him to go serve its country in Iraq, because he was engaged as translator by L-3 Titan Group; he was both delighted and proud. Happy to be able to pay due sound and to carry out that he considered as a duty to this country that he went to defend at the risk of his life.

I know that he made an error by lying, but it was not much to damage his adopted country the USA, that to settle his situation what did not prevent him from serving his homeland with

courage and the heat of the one who wanted to finish the mission which had been confided to him, with the accomplished sense of duty.


I do regret that he lied, he was wrong to do so, but he was young and eager to become an American citizen.





Re: Vincent Alston

I met with Mr. Vincent Alston and his wife, Simone Alston, on the telephone on March 23, 2006. As a very close friend of Mr. Malki's Mr. Alston wanted to give a message to the Judge on Mr. Malki's behalf and felt more comfortable speaking with me than writing directly to the Judge.

Mr. Alston first met Mr. Malki through a friend that who he used to play chess with. The friend brought Mr. Malki one day, and since then, the two have become quite close. Mr. Alston estimates that he has known Nour for about ten years. Mr. Malki became close not only to Mr. Alston but also to his wife and children. The two developed a deep bond and continued playing chess regularly. Mr. Malki came over nearly every day and would frequently pick the children up from school, take them to doctor's appointments or just play with them around the house and the neighborhood. Mr. Malki would take the children shopping and indulge them in ways that even their parents thought was beyond the necessary. Mr. Malki often joined the family at their house in New Jersey. He would get up early and take as many as nine children, friends and children of the Alston's, out for breakfast. Mr. Malki would often wind up spending the entire day with the kids - going from breakfast to the park to the movies.

Mr. Alston described Mr. Malki as a man who "put himself out of the way" for people. He would offer rides to places he was not going, run errands for those who couldn't and just generally give of his time and energy to help those who needed it.

Mr. Alston described Mr. Malki as hardworking and dedicated. He stated that Mr. Malki came to this country with "nothing" but managed to get educated and apply for work. Mr. Alston pointed out that Mr. Malki searched for many jobs and did not seem concerned with getting a job with the Department of Defense. In fact, Mr. Alston recalled that Mr. Malki even started another one before he was offered a better paying position with the Department of Defense which he then accepted.

Mr. Alston recalled that Mr. Malki came voluntarily when he was called back from Iraq. He recalled that while he was at the house after his return, Nour seemed relaxed and the two played chess as usual. The day before Mr. Malki's initial interview and arrest, Mr. Alston and Mr. Malki were playing a chess. During the game, Mr. Alston asked Mr. Malki if he was worried and suggested that he call just to check in the officer. Mr. Malki called, made an appointment to go in at 9am the next day. He seemed relaxed and did not appear to be aware of any cause for concern. Mr. Alston guessed, based on his demeanor, that Mr. Malki "had no idea that he was going to be detained."

After his arrest, Mr. Malki was given one phone call and he called Mr. Alston. Mr. Alston

recalled his surprise at hearing that they had interrogated his friend for so long and also recalled the confusion and growing concern of his friend. Mr. Alston expressed sorrow and shock at the arrest of Mr. Malki and about the situation he currently faces. He described Mr. Malki as his best and closest friend. Mr. Alston stated that while it may be true that Mr. Malki falsified documents to come to this country, he was a standup American who never broke the law. He noted that Mr. Malki worked in the armed forces so that he could help people and that, in fact, he risked his life for the lives of others regularly while he was in Iraq. He stated repeatedly that he wanted to learn of a way that he could directly help his close friend and shared an interest in sponsoring him to become a citizen.

I, the undersigned Ismail Dwedar, am US citizen residing at 6822 4th Ave., Brooklyn , NY 11220. My family consist of myself, my wife and 4 daughters all born in USA. I have known Mr. Almaliki since the fall of 1999 when we were taking a computer class together in Brooklyn College. He was also pursuing his Master in Computer Science department at the same college. We worked in groups in that class, Mr. Almaliki was part of my group. As a team player in our group, he was very talented and helpful. When he finish his part of the work, he goes to helped whoever needed help in the group. He was a great help in achieving success for our group project.

Even in our computer lab, he did not only finish his work but he also helped others in doing their work. Because of his excellent English communicating and knowledge of computers, Mr. Almaliki gave a great portion of his time to other students.

Since that time and because of his good spirit and great help to others, we became very close friends. I also observed how Mr. Almaliki helped people in his community by translating and explaining to them what they did not understand. He helped my friend from Yemen, to obtain required license for his store without charging him a penny. Also, I observed him in our computer lab when he jumped to prevent a fight between two students and he spent some time helping them resolve their problem. Mr. Almaliki was very kind to female students and treated them as his sisters. He also helped me in preparing for my comprehensive exam (exit exam). I am very grateful to him because without his help I would have never passed my exam and graduated.

Mr. Almaliki is a serious and hard working person who earns his living through hard long hours to support himself and pay for his education. He joined the army as a linguist in Iraq to translate and make our army and Iraqi citizens understand each other without any problem. His love for his country made him join the army in a dangerous mission to liberate the Iraqi people. Even though I explained to him the high risk of the mission, he insisted in going. He said "If I didn't help my country now, so when?".


I was really shocked when I learned from his attorney that he was incarcerated because of a mistake that he had made earlier (The allegedly falsified information on his immigration application).

Re: Pauline James

I spoke with Mrs. Pauline Jones on the telephone on January 27, 2006. Mrs. James wanted to give a message to the Judge on Mr. Malki's behalf and she felt more comfortable speaking with me than writing directly to the Judge.

Mrs. James estimated that she has known Mr. Nouredine Malki for fourteen years. She refers to him by his nickname, Nour. She met him through her daughter, Tovia. Tovia and Nour dated for 14 years. They met in approximately 1989, sixteen years ago. Nour would come to the house almost every day and spend time with the family. Everybody of the block knew him and he was known as someone who was always willing to help the neighborhood with things that they needed to do. Nour might have a doctor's appointment and, if someone needed help with something, he would cancel it or change it just to come and help them.

Nour would often join Tovia to pick up Mrs. James from work. Mrs. James relied on Nour and could have called him at anytime of the day and know that he would come and pick her up. He would leave all the way from downtown, pick her up, drop her off at the house, only go back home. He frequently went out of his way for the whole family. Mrs. James described Nour as "a fantastic guy."

Several years ago, Nour traveled with the family to Jamaica. He stayed with Mrs. James's sister and traveled around the Island with the family. They went Scuba diving and traveled all around. He came with the family to Haiti once as well, in August, 2003. Each of these times the family invited him into their private homes and treated him as family. Likewise, he was always respectful, helpful and warm - like family.

During the 1990's, Nour spent about 2 years living with the James family. He was given his own room, in the basement, and the family provided him with food and shelter. He ate meals with the family and became, for all intents and purposes, a member of the family. Nour has always had respect for the family and, in turn, they have always had respect for him. Nour stayed with the family until he was able to afford his own apartment. He got an apartment on Hoyt Street downtown. Still, he would come by regularly to see the family.

Nour began his work for the government because of his love for the government. He wanted to help America in every way he could and Mrs. James recalls him sharing that desire with her directly. When he was in the military, the James family looked after his property in Brooklyn. He would send money to the family and they would pay his rent for him.

Mrs. James made it clear that she understands Nour has been accused of doing something wrong

and that she still believe that he is an “honest, willing, and truthful person.” She knows Nour as person who “will move the world for you” and was pleased to have the opportunity to share this knowledge of Nour with the judge.

I spoke with Ms. Evans on February 4, 2006, about any statement she would like to make to Judge Korman concerning Mr. Nouredine Malki, who she knows as Nour. Ms. Evans said she would like to speak to the Judge on behalf of Mr. Malki, but would feel more comfortable being interviewed by me, rather than writing a letter on her own.

Ms. Evans has known Mr. Malki since 2000. She would see Mr. Malki whenever she went to visit her brother, Winston James. Even after he moved out, Mr. Malki would often come over while she was visiting, and he would always walk her to the subway when she ended her visit.

Ms. Evans also knows Mr. Malki as someone who goes out of his way to help other people, and he helped her a great deal with her computer. Mr. Malki taught her to use some of the programs and features on her computer that she was having trouble with. In March 2005, when Ms. Evans decided to get a DSL hook-up for her computer, Mr. Malki spent two hours setting it up, and then came over at least three times afterwards and spent at least an hour talking to her and making sure her computer worked.

Ms. Evans feels very badly about what has happened to Mr. Malki, and she hopes Judge Korman will consider the fact that he was always helpful and caring to others when he decides what should happen to Mr. Malki.

Re: Sister Lynette Verneer

I spoke with Sister Verneer on the telephone on February 9, 2006. Sister Verneer wanted to give a message to the Judge on Mr. Malki's behalf and she felt more comfortable speaking with me than writing directly to the Judge.

Sister Verneer has known Mr. Malki for seven years. She lived near Mr. Malki and knew him as a neighbor. She described Mr. Malki as somebody who is always ready and willing to pitch in, as well as someone that "you can really look up to." She recalled that he helped just about anyone around their home or in the community. He helped her with different tasks ranging from paperwork to house work to food shopping. Each summer, Nour helped Sister Verneer install her air conditioner.

Sister Verneer was not aware of the specific offense when first contacted her but after having learned about it she was explicit that this offense is only a small part of who he is and that, in fact, he is a very caring and helpful person.

I spoke with Mrs. Janet Ford on the telephone on February 9, 2006. Mrs. Ford wanted to give a message to the Judge on Mr. Malki's behalf and she felt more comfortable speaking with me than writing directly to the Judge.

Mrs. Ford was able to get to know Mr. Malki through Mrs. James. She worked with Mrs. James in a Brooklyn hospital for at least ten years, several of which overlapped with the time that Nour lived with and befriended the James family. Nour would pick both Mrs. James and Mrs. Ford up from the hospital and drive them home, along with Mrs. James. Mrs. James trusted Nour and saw that Nour was obviously close to the family. She described him as "almost a son" to Mrs. James. He would come to the hospital several nights a week to pick the women up from work and often they would all eat dinner together. Mrs. Ford has always been touched that even when he was in Iraq, Nour would ask to speak with Mrs. Ford.

Mrs. Ford described Nour as a good, caring man and a friendly person. Mrs. Ford was surprised when she learned about the offense and said that she could not imagine him committing any wrongful act. She had never heard of him doing anything wrong or illegal outside of this offense.

I spoke with Sister Anderson on the telephone on February 21, 2006. Sister Anderson wanted to give a message to the Judge in support of Mr. Malki however she felt more comfortable speaking with me than writing directly to the Judge.

Sister Rosetta Anderson was introduced to Mr. Malki by Mrs. Pauline James. She knows him to be honest and always pleasant and even after being made aware of the offense spoke very highly of him. She recalled that Nour would never allow her to walk alone to the car and was very well-mannered. Nour often joined Sister Anderson and the James family in collective prayer. She knows that Nour and the James family are very close and though this is part of why she trusted him so readily she also got to know Mr. Malki on his own and believes that he is a fine, upstanding individual.
